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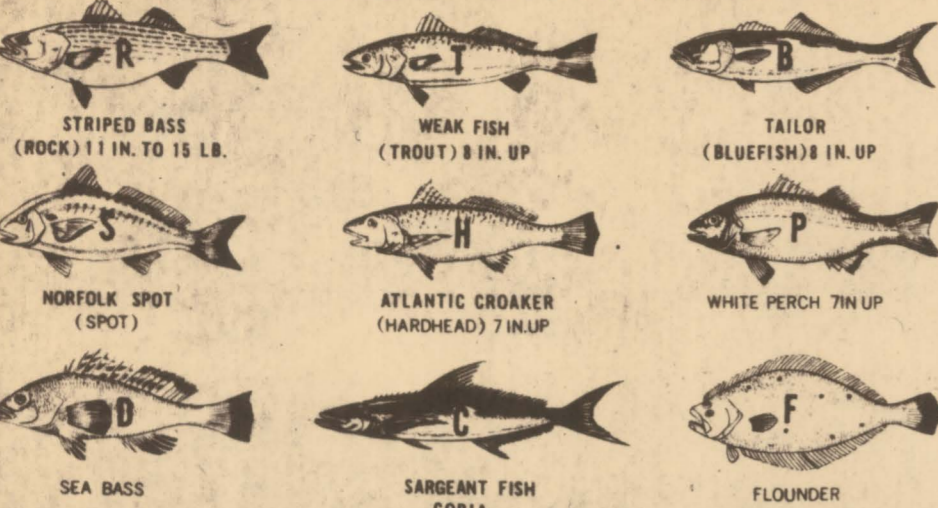

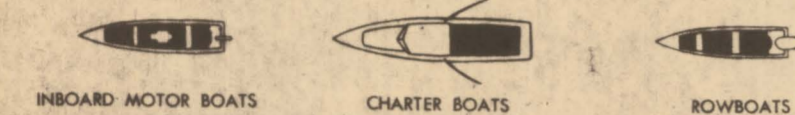
### Fishing Symbols

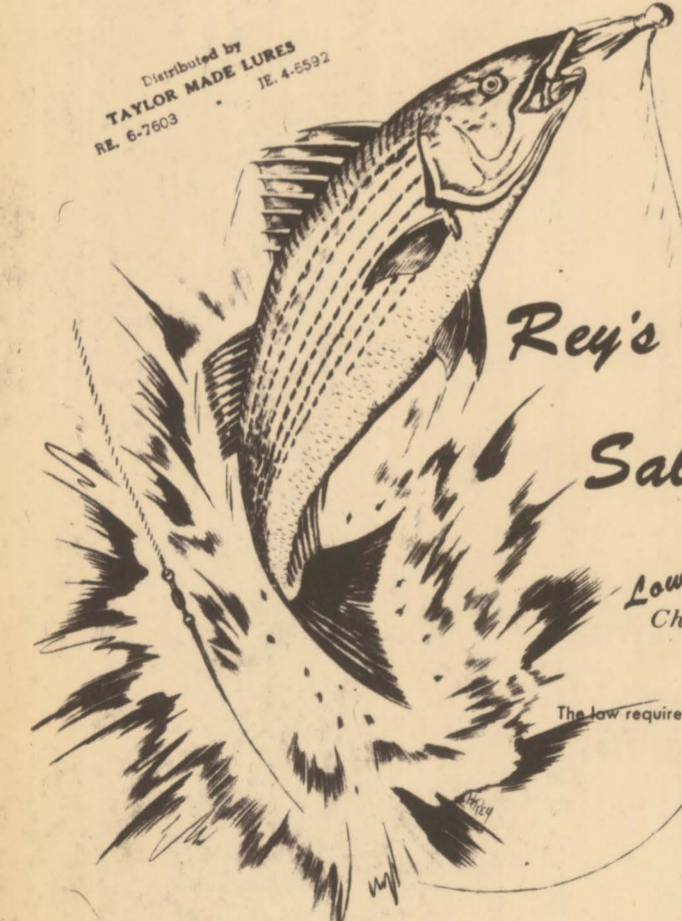
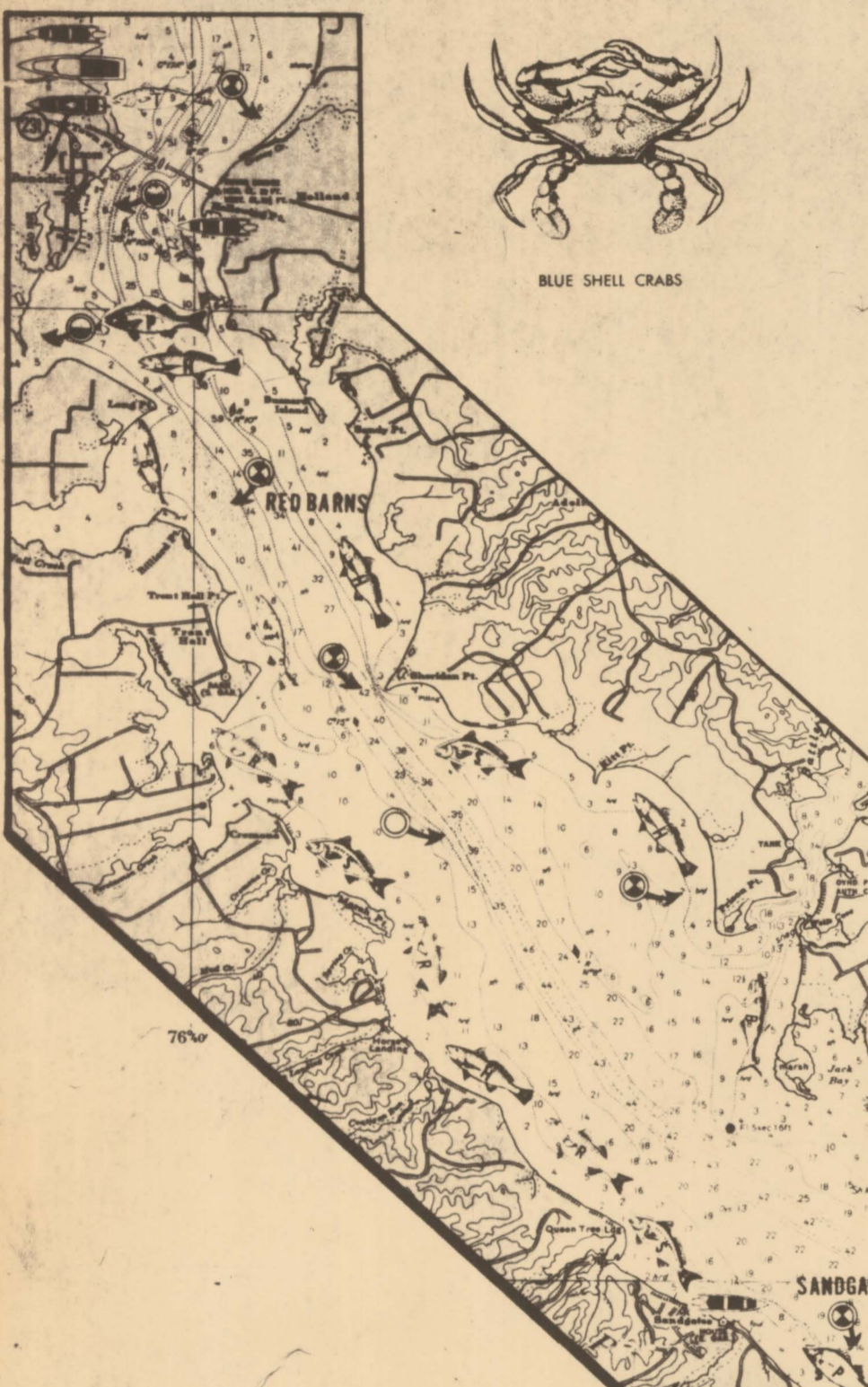


TROLLING ○ STILL FISHING ● TROLLING & BOTTOM ⊕ SURF FISHING ▲

**GENERAL INFORMATION:**  
Success of a salt water fishing trip hinges upon such conditions as tide, wind and weather. By checking with newspapers, radio and sporting goods stores, you can obtain information mentioned above.

**NOT FOR NAVIGATION PURPOSES:**  
The hydrographic data, courtesy of U.S. Department of Commerce, is placed on this chart solely for the purpose of assisting fishermen in locating fishing areas. This data is not current and should not be used for navigational purposes.

**COMPASS ROSE:**  
The outer circle is marked in degrees from zero to 360°, with zero at true north. The inner circle is marked in points on the outer rim, the arrow indicates magnetic north.

**FISH TRAP AREA:**  
Fish trap area boundaries are shown in green as follows:  
Exercise caution submerged piling may be present within these areas.

**CAUTION:**  
Improved channels, indicated in broken lines and subject to shoaling especially at the edges.

**RESTRICTED AREAS:**  
All watercraft upon being warned shall leave the area designated as restricted immediately except when given specific navigational instructions.

**PASSAGE THROUGH PROHIBITED AREAS:**  
Vessels may pass through the prohibited area via the designated passages when fishing is not in progress.

**METHODS OF FISHING:**  
Still Fishing—Still fishing will produce Spot, White Perch, Hardheads, Rock, Trout, occasional Flounder, Sea Bass and Bluefish.  
A variety of bait used for fishing in the Bay can consist of bloodworms, grass shrimp, soft shell and peeler crabs, squid, eels, clom, fresh shrimp and cut fish.  
Trolling—Trolling for Striped Bass, Bluefish and Weakfish are more successful in the areas indicated in the red on the chart. Trolling covers a greater area of water than still fishing. While trolling one is apt to see schools of Blue or Striped Bass, or see flocks of gulls diving for bait fish which have been killed by a school of large fish. When a school is sighted, circle the school and work your line into the edges. In this manner, you will avoid frightening the fish away. Flugs enabling you to take more fish.  
Buckskins with pork rind, spoon, and sea slugs are used for trolling. If deep trolling becomes necessary a wire line is recommended because it enables the fisherman to avoid the stretch that is experienced with conventional lines while fishing at great depths. The use of a roller tip prevents kinks in the line.  
One method of taking large Striped Bass is slow trolling the "bottom" at night on sea slugs.  
Another unusual yet productive fishing method is floating soft shell or peeler crabs at night in shallow water.  
(CHARTER BOATS)  
Charter boats are more readily available on weekdays than on week-ends. Before chartering a boat decide when and where you would like to fish and which boat you wish to charter. Communicate with the captain and make the necessary arrangements. Verify the cost for your party, determine departure and return time. Order necessary bait. Above all if you cannot keep a reservation notify bottom immediately.  
The charter fishing boats and small boats shown on chart are not entirely complete, and obviously so. If you know of any others not found on this chart, notify us and they will be added to the chart in the next revision.

**EXCELLENT FISHING AREAS**  
While fishing in these areas, keep a sharp look out for birds diving in water. This may be a good indication that the Rock or Bluefish are feeding.
